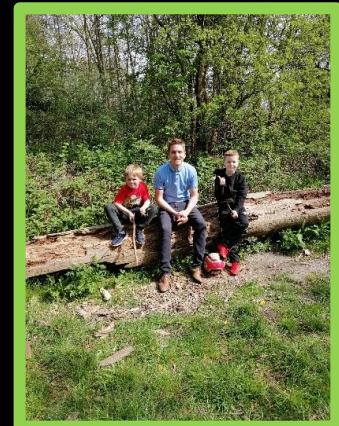




THORNES PARK!
